The approximate ages of each of the Pilgrims in 1620 are noted in parenthesis.

1. William Brewster (54), was the leader of the Separatist group from their early days in England (around 1605) and was the Ruling Elder of Plymouth Colony from 1620 until his death in 1644. He was the only Pilgrim known to have attended college.
2. Thomas Rogers (49) was one of several Pilgrims who were involved in the sale or manufacture of textiles. He is, however, the only one identified as a camlet merchant. He died in early 1621 during “the great sics” when nearly half of the Pilgrims died.
3. Stephen Hopkins (42) had lived in the colony at Jamestown for several months in 1609. Prior to arriving at Jamestown, he had been sentenced to be hanged for mutiny after the ship he was on had been shipwrecked near Bermuda.
4. William Bradford (31) was elected Governor in March, 1621, following the death of Governor Carver and held that position for thirty of the next thirty-five years. During the years when he did not serve as Governor, he had been elected, but declined to accept the position.
5. Edward Winslow (25) was frequently diplomatic leader in dealings with the Indians, performed marriages as a magistrate for which he was jailed for seventeen weeks during a return visit to England and served in Oliver Cromwell’s government in England after 1649
6. Richard More (6) was one of four illegitimate children born to Katherine More who were put on the first available ship from England to America (the Mayflower) to avoid a family scandal. Only Richard survived the first winter. The book entitled “The Mayflower Bastard” tells the story of these children.
7. Myles Standish (36) was a soldier in Europe for many years and was selected as the Pilgrims military leader before they left Holland, but was not formally appointed to that position as their Captain until March, 1621. He was short, had a quick temper and was called Captain Shrimp by those who disliked him.
8. Samuel Fuller (40) was the physician for the colony until his death in 1633. He kept no records so little is known of medical practices in the colony. He probably practiced blood letting which was a common treatment of the time. Nothing is known of his medical training.
9. John Howland (21) was a servant to John Carver who was swept overboard during a severe storm. He was able to catch a line dangling from the ship and was pulled to safety. The seaman who did not secure the line was given a whipping for his negligence.
10. John Billington (40) was executed in September, 1630, after he had killed a man he had an ongoing dispute with. The Billington family seemed to be in constant conflict with other members of the Colony. President James Garfield is a descendant of John Billington.
11. John Alden (21) was hired to be a part of the ship’s crew as the cooper or barrel maker. He married Mayflower passenger Priscilla Mullins (after supposedly proposing to her for a shy Myles Standish) and became one of the leaders in the colony at an early age.

We have entered 3371 individuals into the database and we have substantiated each and every one of these individuals with either a proof and/or a citation that makes our database unique among other Mayflower families (5,332 citations and graphics which are viewable). WHY is this important? What it means is that descendants will not only be able to trace their ancestor to Thomas Rogers, but will know where the information came from.

You will note that when you visit the database (<http://www.thomasrogerssociety.com/trs-project-p/index.htm>) that not only are there the facts about the lineages, but surnames, charts, resources and places. All of these lead back to our relationship to Thomas Rogers. We are not only adding 6th and 7th Generations, but all generations of those who have a line except if they are still living.

Though this is a project that is well under way we have only just begun. We are at the tip of the iceberg. The permutations of genealogy, equates to millions of names that will have to be added. We, as a society, have three filling cabinets filled with information gathered by Nancy Frederick that will take years to add to the data base along with information from our membership.

Everyone who submits a lineage will be included in the database as time permits. The complete database will only be shared with members. The on line database includes all members, but only reflects those who have a lineage to Thomas Rogers, but are no longer living.

It is our hope that you as MEMBERS will continue to support this project and hope that you will consider sending donations. We only ask that you visit our database to see how it works and how important this project is.

Much has been written about the Pilgrims - the men, women, and children who arrived in New England on the ship *Mayflower* in 1620. Some authors have attempted to correct some of the “myths” about the Pilgrims, yet have often presented information just as misleading. This carefully researched publication has pulled together the facts and the latest thinking about this group of people who, though few in number, were so influential in the development of this country.

A few of the questions addressed in this book are: Who were the Pilgrims? Had any of the Pilgrims lived in this country before 1620? What were their views on marriage, celebrating Christmas, and capital punishment? Did they begin our Thanksgiving holiday? Were they involved in any conflicts with Native Americans? Who had crossed the Atlantic six times before the Pilgrims met him in Plymouth in 1620?

The author, William P. Muttart, is a member of the Mayflower Society in Connecticut. He is also the secretary of the (Pilgrim) Thomas Rogers Society and has written several articles about the Pilgrims for various publications. The co-author, Linda R. Ashley, is the former librarian for the Mayflower Society Library in Plymouth and has served as the curator for the (Pilgrim) John Alden House Museum in Duxbury, Massachusetts. She has written several articles for *Mayflower Quarterly* magazine.
